North Imaging Alliance Engagement Event update

Background

The North Imaging Alliance (NIA) Executive Board suggested that an event could be held to promote sharing and learning between the North of Scotland Boards.

The NIA core team planned the event which took place on 28th June 2023, at the Crowne Plaza Aberdeen Airport hotel.

Purpose

The main purpose of this event was to bring together the North Boards to develop specific pieces of work and promote sharing and learning between them and to also provide an overview of the work the NIA is doing. Also, we are trying to make explicit connections to other national education and engagement activities eg via SCIN, SRTP & Professional bodies in describing & promoting the full range of opportunities to

- avoid duplication of effort and outputs
- maximise use of scarce time and capacity of staff in Boards
- ensure a commitment to planning & providing person centred and added value activities

As well as the planned speakers, Colin Brown and Craig Burrows from FujiFilm also attended with the Ultra-portable diagnostics car, which attendees were able to view and have an overview from Colin & Craig.

Analysis

The event went ahead on 28th June 2023, with 48 people in attendance. The attendees were a mix of radiologists, radiographers, service managers & data analysts and there was at least one attendee from each North Board.

Feedback

Patient Involvement

Following the presentations on Patient Involvement, participants were asked to discuss the challenges and opportunities to obtain and review feedback from patients and caregivers when developing and assessing their services. Analysis of the discussion highlighted 8 key areas for consideration.

Key themes;



Next steps;

- Review of feedback from tabletop discussions is to be shared with patient reps
- Identify patient advisory groups and seek their views on best way to engage
- Develop communications strategy (comms plan in draft)
- Review against QSIN-101: A network policy on patient and service partnerships should be in place

Quality Standards for Imaging Networks – IN-101 Involving patients and carers

- **Quality statement**
 - Patients and carers are involved in the work of the imaging network.
- **Outcome measure**
 - The network can demonstrate impact as a result of patient partnerships and patient involvement.
- **Indicative inputs**
 - A network policy on patient and service partnerships should be in place.
 - The network should focus more on co-production than on approval.
 - The network should have:
 - a. Mechanisms for receiving regular feedback from patients and carers about the treatment and care they receive from all participating organisations across the network
 - b. Mechanisms for involving patients and carers in decisions about the organisation of imaging services across the network



- c. Examples of changes made as a result of the feedback and involvement of patients and carers from across the network
- d. Documentary evidence of patient and carer involvement at network meetings
- Patients and carers should be supported by the network to ensure the opportunity and benefit of their involvement is maximised.

Community Cafe

These are the collated comments from each theme area. The NIA Core Team are reviewing and incorporating this feedback into our workplan for the remainder of 2023/24.

Table 2: Interventional Radiology

The North of Scotland is reported to be understaffed compared with the rest of Scotland (Royal College of Radiologists workforce census) – in some areas there is a reliance on retired radiologists or locums. It is recognised that it is easier to recruit staff where there is already an established substantive staffing complement and where there is a peer support network for trainees.

Areas of concern/ consideration raised by participants;

- What is the impact, positive or negative, of national recruitment?
- Where does IR sit in each of the hospital structures?
- We need to consider the financial implications – of increasing numbers of IR sessions (and the unintended consequences), and use of locums
- Which route do current clinicians take to IR, ie via FY route, other radiology, etc? IR needs to be part of the undergraduate curriculum.
- Consider integration with other specialties, eg diagnostic radiology, paediatrics, and across staff groups
- Can we augment current workforce with radiographers and are there radiographers willing to do this?
- In order to develop or improve sustainable regional pathways we need a consistent, cohesive, collaborative approach.

Table 3: Data & Information

The key themes involved the limitation of the current reporting systems, the difficulties with data definitions and the use of multiple systems – lack of integration resulting in double-keying of data.

There is a need for “once for Scotland” agreement on KPIs, data fields and standardisation of RIS/ fields/ data extracts, there is very little validation currently. Review requirements for local and national reporting.

Table 4: Patient Information & Experience



The attendees at this table were asked to discuss patient information and experience within their service; how well they feel it is acknowledged (ie through feedback); how well information is relayed and what they feel could be done better.

Patient feedback important to help change and support services
Patient experience may correlate with where patient from
Appointment times – still appointment letters but not enough notice given to allow for childcare, work time off etc
Challenge with information leaflets – patients not reading them (just looking at them)
Patients reluctant to divulge relevant information if waiting for appointment for long time
Information hard/difficult to find – make it easier for patients to find on website

What would you change tomorrow

- More scanners
- More staff
- Patient centred booking service – patients can book their own appointment online – allows them to choose the best date and time for them
- Could there be a text service for sending to patients to book their own appointment
- Supporting patients by arranging scans on same day (if need be)

Possible feedback options

- Tablets
- QR codes to service
- Patient Advisory Group who could feedback on various items – website; leaflets

Table 5: Imaging Administration

Once the group understood what was meant by administration the reply was 'they just don't have it'. Over the years admin support has decreased as they are not being replaced when someone leaves meaning the work is picked up by other professions.

Key themes that came out of this discussion were; a desire to move to digital and away from paper-based systems, national systems with cross-board connectivity, investment in admin support and a review of booking processes.

Table 6: Planning Ahead & Strategy

All planning needs to be coherent and linked, not done in silos, reflecting the needs of the population. Patient need should be at the centre, with equipment, finance, workforce etc revolving around this.

To allow the workforce to work across Scotland, not just for individual boards, HR barriers need to be removed.

We should be looking to other countries or boards/ trusts to see what is working well to see if system planning can be replicated as a “once for all” in Scotland.

Table 7: Equipment Challenges

There is a need to balance loss of control and standardisation, needs consultant engagement.

There are clinical, technical and commerce challenges with equipment procurement.

Table 8: Workforce & Quality

The attendees at this table were discussing aspects of workforce & quality – including recruitment & retention; safer staffing and effective job planning. Below are some of the barriers and challenges they have found and some items they would change if they could.

Getting access to appropriate skill mix.

Failures in job matching – if honest job planning can jobs get matched and banded ??

Sharing of information and transparency.

More assistant practitioners – wider scope of practice.

How to include 3rd party companies into the quality conversation i.e. external reporting companies.

Safer staffing – applying tools to smaller teams.

Effective job planning for ALL professionals.

Advanced Practice – Island boards – widening access to clinical support

Advanced practice – not just reporting – rads and nurses.

More interventional MDT working.
